DURING the existence of the Printers' Pension Corporation, which, by the way, is said to be the greatest trade charity in the United Kingdom, £140,000 has been disbursed with an extremely low cost for working expenses, and the invested funds amount to £78,000.

It has again been proved by the Court that proofs of printed work, when ordered, must be paid for by the customer. Some people seem to imagine that proofs cost nothing to produce, and that if they do not give an order for a quantity of any particular "setting," they should not be charged with time and labour expended on the proofs.

A £5 Bank of England note and a quantity of postage stamps is said to have been found in a second-hand book, recently purchased from one of the bookstalls in Farringdon Road. Who says that value for money cannot, even nowadays, be obtained from the coster?

On June 22nd, the seventeenth Annual Dinner of the Correctors of the Press, will be held at De Keyser's Hotel, New Bridge St., E.C. The Lord Mayor, (Alderman Sir William P. Treloar) will preside.

It is reported that there are 100 printing firms in Nottingham, which employ collectively over 5,000 workpeople, with a weekly wage list amounting to over £5,000.

Messrs. W. H. Smith & Sons have secured a renewal of their bookstall and advertising contract upon the Midland Railway Company's system, for a further period of ten years. This is the first important bookstall contract which has come up for renewal since the contracts on the London & North Western and the Great Western Railways were transferred to Messrs. Wyman & Sons, Ltd.



The article was said to reflect discredit upon the union, and the workmen claimed that as it affected them individually, they should each have damages. According to Chambers' Journal, the library at the British Museum now contains upwards of four million volumes, and is, without doubt, the largest in the world. To accommodate this immense number of books, forty-three miles of shelves are required.

From a number of experiments that have been made in Burma, it is believed that bamboo fibre is capable of being turned into paper pulp of excellent quality, at a price which will leave a fair margin of profit.

It has recently been decided in the United States Circuit Court, that any publisher has the right to use the name "Webster" in connection with the publication of a dictionary, the copyright to the use of the name having, it appears, expired as far back as 1889.

The first case under the Prevention of Corruption Act, (1906). was heard at Manchester last month, when a clerk was fined 20s., and ordered to pay ten guineas costs, for giving a railway company's carter a "tip" to carry goods from the premises of his employers to another firm, at which the carter had no occasion to call on the business of the railway company.

Commercial men of all shades of political opinion, and the Associated Chambers of Commerce are unanimous in their desire to see Mr. Lloyd George's Patent Law Amendment Bill on the Statutebook. It will certainly do something in the way of enabling patentees to obtain fair play in this country, for during the past three years over 20,000 British patents have been granted to foreigners, and thousands of these have never been worked in this country. In this way, according to Sir Joseph Lawrence, "they act as a block to British invention, and check opportunities of employment among our own people," If the Bill becomes law, a patent will be granted cheaper than heretofore, and the method of



"Tanner. London." procedure will be simpler. There will also be a cheaper method for the revocation of patents. The aim is that the new law shall encourage invention, reward ingenuity, and so promote industry.

We very much regret to have to record the death of an old friend, Mr. A. H. Hance, who was for many years manager of The Daily Chronicle, and Lloyd's News. A dastardly assault was made upon him one evening, by three well-dressed men, as he was returning home from his club, and was indeed but a few yards from the door of his house in Becmead Avenue, Streatham. The ruffians knocked him down, rendering him unconscious, and stole his gold watch, rings, and every article of value in his possession. He never recovered from the attack, and passed away on April 6th, in his sixty-fourth year. The loss of Mr. Hance, who was well known in Fleet Street circles, is mourned by a wide circle of friends

The first printing press in Scotland was established at Edinburgh in 1508, and it was followed by presses at St. Andrews in 1552, at Stirling in 1571, at Aberdeen in 1622, and at Glasgow in 1638.

In our February issue we announced that the 80th Anniversary Festival of the Printers' Pension Corporation, is to be held at the Hotel Cecil, on Wednesday, May 29th. Lord Northcliffe, who will preside, is making a strenuous appeal to the trade on behalf of the Corporation. He says :- "My connection with the Press has given me intimate knowledge of the splendid work done by this Institution. It is not only economically managed, but it has this further advantage that all who participate in the benefits must have been subscribers for at least ten years. Unfortunately the drain upon the charity during the past twelve months has been greater than at any period of its history; the number of pensioners has now increased to no fewer than 378, the orphans and inmates of the almshouses reach a total of 44—the annual expenditure in benefits being not less than £6,005."

Is Pressure Essential? UNDER the title, "Is Caxton's Method Best?" Mr. Daniel T. Powell, who has had a life-long experience of printing machinery of all kinds, contributes an interesting article to *The Printers*'

Register. The writer draws attention to the many improvements that have been made in regard to machinery, but affirms that all the method of getting the ink on to the paper has been Caxton's. He suggests that the system of heavy impressions is all wrong, and brings forth a large amount of evidence to substantiate his claim. For instance, Mr. Powell says: "A man brought up to the ruling business knows quite well that if he wants to mark the paper he must set his pens so as to have the lightest pressure possible. Why, the very act of writing upon paper is best performed by those who merely float the pen on the surface of the paper, any pressure meaning failure, or at best poor caligraphy at a slow speed." The writer then asks, "To what end do these thoughts lead us? Surely, to pause and ask, Must we always use hard or metal surfaces to transfer ink to paper? Is it necessary to construct ponderous, massive machinery to print our newspapers, books, pictures, and commercial stationery?" Mr. Powell ventures to say that it is not, and that in a few years the whole process of printing will be altered. We shall print from a vielding, flexible surface with specially prepared ink on paper peculiarly suitable to the needs. The writer can see a machine on the rotary principle with cylinders of glass having a beautifully polished, even surface. on which are placed flexible casts or stereos of the matter, and light polished steel rollers to ink the casts, composition rollers only being necessary to distribute the ink. No impression cylinder will be used—the paper will just make contact with the face of the flexible cast and the ink will be transferred clearly and indelibly, and the work produced in as highly-finished a style as anything turned out to-day. The writer then draws attention to the methods employed for printing on tin, and mentions the "Orloff" machine for colour printing, in support of his theory.






This machine, it will be remembered, uses a flexible surface on which to collect the transfer of the various forms in different colours, and then transfers all together to the sheet of paper. Mr. Powell points out that by this process it is quite easy to print on glass, and that lantern slides and show tablets in colours are being produced from flexible casts of half-tones, etc., which are in many cases better than the photographs themselves. If this can be satisfactorily accomplished on glass with practically no pressure, how much easier, asks the writer, must it be to print on paper?

WHITE spaces in rules and corners unsatisfactorily Joining Rules, joined are always an evesore, and more often than not cause the customer considerable annovance. Some months ago we published a practical note on the joining of rules, and we find, in a recent issue of The Practical Printer, that another hint is given on this subject, which we publish, as it may be found useful by some of our readers. The writer of the article in question hit upon the following remedy:-"Despite infinite care, a gap persisted after locking up a forme. Rules were taken out and compared, and both sides proved to be the same length. Having some tinfoil at hand, it was folded over and over until it was slightly thicker than the gap. It was then inserted in the gap and the forme locked up; the result was perfect. The locking squeezed out the excess of material which was then trimmed off with a sharp knife. The joint could not be seen. Owing to the success attained in the above case. the idea proved useful in another cover page containing a boxed-in title. Two of the corners proved refractory by showing hair-line Without unlocking the forme the gaps were forced slightly larger, and the tinfoil inserted and trimmed, with the result that the joins could not be seen."

Those printers who have a bindery will be interested to learn that an American inventor has patented a process for applying gold leaf. This apparatus is somewhat after the style of the pyrographic pencil used for what is commonly known as poker-work. but it is so arranged that the point can be kept at a much lower temperature than is necessary for pyrography. The gold leaf is picked up by means of a piece of paraffined paper and then transferred to the point of application with the paper uppermost. The heated iron is then passed over it with a slight pressure, and upon removal of the paper the gold leaf will be found firmly fixed to the article as desired.



WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

A COMPANY has been formed, chiefly amongst the Manchester printers, under the title of the Printing Trades and General Insurance Co., Ltd., with registered offices at 68 Atlantic Chambers, Brazenose St., Manchester. The Capital is £100,000, in £5 shares, and the Company will deal with Employers' Liability and Fire Insurance business, but particularly with the printing and newspaper trades.

Still they come! It is reported that another line-casting machine is to be placed on the English market.

One of the typefounders, we notice, is making a special offer of loaning type to printers, for short periods, at quite a nominal charge.

Messrs. Hazell, Watson and Viney, Ltd., seem to have taken a step in the right direction. They have sent two of their overseers to the United States in order that they may have an opportunity of inspecting the latest machinery and methods for letterpress printing, as employed by our American cousins.

At the last Annual General Meeting of the shareholders of Messrs. Cassell & Co., Ltd., the directors announced that although there was a profit on the year's trading of £11,206, they were unable to recommend payment of a dividend, as they considered it the better policy to nurse resources. It was pointed out that the business has been completely re-organized, and that a system has been adopted, which the directors feel confident will, in course of time, prove completely satisfactory to the shareholders.

The South African Colonies are being urged to set up their own printing works in the same way that all the Australian Colonies have done, instead of obtaining tenders from other countries. The South African Trade Union points out that this would lead to greater public economy, and greater stability for workpeople.

A report has been going the round of the Press to the effect that the Bible Societies of America, England and Scotland have formed themselves into a trust, with the avowed intention of stifling competition, and of raising the prices of Bibles by nearly 50 per cent. It seems to us that this will have the effect of stemming the tide of voluntary contributions to the various Bible Societies.

To give an idea of what some firms spend on advertising, the Mazawattee Tea Company, have transferred £15,000 to their advertising fund for the current year. This reminds us that the Yarmouth Corporation have voted £900, which is equivalent to a penny rate, for the purpose of advertising the town as a holiday resort throughout the present year. This will prove, no doubt, to

be £900 well invested.

Referring to the articles which appeared in our last two issues as to the maintenance of prices, we see that at a recent meeting of the Melbourne Master Printers' Association, the important question of estimates and prices to be charged to the public was brought up for settlement. Reference was made to the great discrepancies occurring in the prices quoted by different firms, and to the necessity of a common basis on which to prepare estimates. According to The Sales and Wants Advertiser, it was resolved that the following figures be regarded as actual cost: Hand composition-2s. per hour. Machining-platen, 1s. 6d.; cylinder, up to crown, 2s. 6d.; to double crown, 3s.; quad crown, 3s. 6d.; perfecters and tworevolutions, 4s. 6d. For apprentices' time-first, second and third years, Is. per hour; fourth, fifth, and sixth years, Is. 6d.; seventh year, 2s. Further, that 25 per cent. be allowed for profit on labour, and 15 to 25 per cent. on paper or other material.

According to Commercial Intelligence, "the reduction of postal rates on magazines and trade journals to Canada is a welcome concession to reason and common sense. We have from time to time drawn attention to the pernicious matter of American origin sold in the Dominion at popular prices to the younger generation. We are glad that there will now be an opportunity for publishers in this country to counteract the influence of the American dime novel by introducing literature of a more wholesome nature and without the strong anti-British sentiment that inspires the writers of low-class American fiction."
