I T is with a certain amount of diffidence that we have to announce the fact that the paper mills are increasing prices all round. Some of the reasons for this advance were given in our last issue. At present we are simply running on stocks, but we would like our friends to know that a general advance in prices will, we fear, be compulsory in the near future.

The full name and address of the owners of every newspaper and magazine published in America must now appear on each issue. Persons violating this law are subject to a fine of not less than $\pounds 20$ for each publication so issued.

In the opinion of the Attorney-General, Christmas presents, which really have that character, and are openly and honestly given as such, cannot be prohibited by the new Act.

The Federation of Master Printers and Allied Trades of the United Kingdom of Great Britian and Ireland, will hold their next Annual Conference at Glasgow.

The Acting British Consul at Chicago (Mr. T. Erskine) reports that a consolidation of paper mills is being brought to a successful conclusion by the International Paper Company, and that all the plants in Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota will be taken in. It is stated that within a year the Company, which has an authorized capital of $f_24,000,000$, will control the paper market of the United States, and to do this, will spend from six to ten million pounds in buying up the plants in the States named.

Last month the minutes of the evidence heard by the Government Select Committee on Publications, were issued as a Blue Book, together with the Committee's report. In it Mr. Rowland Bailey, M.V.O., the Controller of the Stationery Office, gives an instance of a Foreign Office paper, which, as printed, cost $\pounds 221$, but which

could have been produced for £50 by simply altering the style. It appears, also, that 20 per cent. is added for printing all matter that is of a confidential nature. This addition has been made to most of the printed matter emanating from the Foreign Office, whereas Mr. Bailey holds that the bulk of the publications are Consular Reports, the very essence of which is publicity. Attention is drawn to other publications which have cost, in one instance, £156 and could have been produced for £103; and in another instance £195 10s. has been paid for work that might have been done for £171. The report is eminently practical and will, no doubt, lead to a great saving in the future.

The Manchester Guardian has been converted into a private limited liability company, with a capital of $\pounds 160,000$ in $\pounds 10$ shares, 8,000 of which are preference shares.

Mr. W. A. Beaumont, the Superintendent Inspector of Factories for the Southern Division, states that there were, last year, 118 accidents in London caused by platen machines, and 103 accidents from other machines in printing offices within the Metropolitan area.

The Columbus Penitentiary News, a well-known and flourishing daily paper, published by convicts, has suspended publication. It appears that there is not, at present, a single man in that big penal institution that can handle type. Comment is needless.

Two lady inspectors contribute a very interesting chapter to the Annual Report of the Chief Inspector of Factories. They have visited the principal printing works in the larger towns and hold, "that the two conditions requiring serious attention in the industry are the low standard of ventilation in the factories, and the dirty and dusty condition of the floors throughout the printing and composing rooms. The comparatively low standard of health among the workers in the industry is mainly attributable to one or other of these causes, both of which, we desire to point out, are preventable."

Mr. A. H. Gill, M.P., speaking at the annual conference of the Lancashire branches of the Typographical Association, said that the Association had paid only £37,373 in strike pay, whereas they had disbursed £314,000 in friendly benefits.

These were divided as follows: Bohemian and Moravian, 12; Croatian and Slovenic, 5; Dutch and Flemish, 19; English, 144; Finnish, 4; French, 17; Hebrew, 393; Irish, 39; Italian, 94; Lithuanian; 2: Magyar, 26; Polish, 18; Scandinavian (Norwegian, Swedish and Danish), 57; Slovak, 54; unclassed, 6.

According to the London Typographical Journal, the week-toweek system, by which compositors are held in suspense while their employers renew their engagement each week without allowing them to become entitled to a fortnight's notice, has received a severe blow. A member of the L.S.C., told to "come in on Monday," and being discharged without further notice, took the case to court and obtained satisfaction before the case came on for hearing. The fortnight's wages were paid into court, and all the men in the employ of the defendants engaged in the week-to-week system were given a fortnight's notice.

At a newspaper exhibition held at Frankfort-on-Main, the oldest one exhibited came from China and was established in the year 911.

The editor of the *Caxton Magazine* has a grievance, and it is against the German Customs' officers. It appears that a parcel of "Caxtons," sent to Germany, was assessed at 6/9 duty, notwithstanding the well-known fact that books and newspapers are not chargeable with duty. The Customs' officers mistook our well known contemporary for a trade catalogue, hence the trouble. We had a somewhat similar experience. On arrival at Hamburg during our last visit to Germany, we had with us samples to the value of about $\pounds 60$. After a good deal of consultation the Customs' officers decided that they were liable to duty to the extent of $\pounds 45$. This we refused to pay, and after about four hours' good hard work we were allowed to pass after paying 16/0 duty. Such are the ways of German officialdom, but we must admit that, through it all, the officers were most courteous.

On Friday, September 27th, Messrs. Hodgson & Co., the wellknown firm of book auctioneers, in Chancery Lane, and one of our oldest customers, celebrated their centenary. A dinner was given in the evening, which was largely attended, our Mr. W. A. Tanner being amongst the guests. Altogether it was a very enjoyable event, and it marked a red-letter day in the history of the firm. We heartily join in wishing Messrs. Hodgson & Co. long and continued prosperity.

The Cover.

In catalogues, booklets and pamphlets of every description, the cover is of first importance, for it has, primarily, to attract the attention. It should,

therefore, be the most important note in the scheme of design, and the type used, as well as the paper and the printing ink, should receive very careful consideration. As regards the former, Mr. Theodore De Vinne gives the following simple and concise rules:-"The type used should be plain and broad, and bold enough to show the colour used in reasonable purity. The words should be symmetrically grouped. Unbalanced display and ragged endings of text lines should be avoided. In all cases there should be abundant relief of unprinted space for background. Nothing destroys the general effect so much as the huddling of type and concealment of the relieving background. To my notion three printings are enough to use on a coloured paper; two printings are often much better. The general effect is weakened, not improved, by a multiplicity of colours. The decorative ornament employed should be in plain, strong outline, or in white outline on a solid background. Shading and intricate borders or decorations, beautiful as they may be in black ink on white paper, are nearly always disappointing when printed in bright colour on paper of a strong tint. Types of small body and light face should not be selected for use on dark-coloured papers. Legibility is of the first importance, since the object of all printing is not merely to show colour, nor paper, nor skill in composition, but the thought and intent of the writer." Equal consideration should be given to the paper used for the cover, and the colour should, in a measure, be selected to be in keeping with the descriptive pages of the catalogue or booklet. For instance, a darkcoloured cover is hardly suitable for summer dress materials, nor is a very light cover exactly suitable for a catalogue emanating from a mourning warehouse. Moreover, the quality of the paper should be as good as possible, so as to create a favourable impression from the outset. The "Salisbury" cover papers will be found to answer every purpose, and as they are supplied in a wide range of colours, they can be adapted to all classes of work. feature of the cover is the ink with which it is printed. This should be chosen to tone with the colour of the paper, and in no way to clash with it. There must be complete harmony in the two, so that the one will assist the other in securing an attractive and effective combination.



M^{R.} ADOLPH TUCK states that there are from twelve to fourteen hundred million picture post cards produced and sold annually. It appears that the demand for the betterclass cards increases each year.

The *Staffordshire Sentinel* states, that Messrs. Wyman & Sons Ltd., contemplate transferring their Reading works to Stafford.

Representatives of the Linotype Users' Association have signed a new agreement, which comes into force on Oct. 1st., and so remains for seven years. The document defines the hours, wages, and general working conditions of the offices of members of the Association.

In inviting tenders for the printing of the *Commonwealth Year* Book, the Australian Government has specially stipulated that it must be set by hand, and not by machines. The reasons have not been given for this conservatism. It is, however, estimated that five tons of type will be necessary for the production of the book.

According to *The Sales and Wants Advertiser*, there are a number of papers in Tokio and Osaka which have daily issues of more than 100,000. The *Osaka Mainichi* sells 220,000 copies a day, and the circulation of the *Asahi* is almost as great. The most widely circulated newspaper in Tokio is the *Hochi Shimbun*. It is the organ of Count Okuma, and is an influential journal. The highest priced papers in Japan do not sell for more than the equivalent of one halfpenny, and in many cases the price is less than a



farthing. An advertising rate of 6d, a line is considered high, and it is seldom that more than $\int 30$ is paid for a full page advertisement. Coloured supplements, with spirited illustrations after the Japanese manner, are common, and novels have been published in daily instalments for more than thirty years. All composition is done by hand because in the language there are about 27,000 characters in common use. The composing room of a Japanese newspaper is necessarily a large apartment, and the type is arranged in shelves along the walls.

A Swedish engineer is said to have invented an addressing machine which is capable of executing 3,000 addresses in an hour at an expense of 3d. We would like to hear more about the machine.

On account of the recent consistent fall in the quotations of the London metal market for antimony and lead, the Linotype and Machinery, Ltd., have been enabled to make a considerable reduction in the price of their standard metals.

During the past season over £130,000 has been spent on old books and manuscripts in the London salerooms alone. The most valuable book offered was the Van Antwerp copy of the first folio edition of Shakespeare's Works which fetched £3,600.

According to recent reports, the directors of the Financier & Bullionist have declared a dividend at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum. The profits of the Aberdeen University Press Ltd., for the year ended June 30th last, amount to \pounds 4,880 17s. 7d., making with the balance brought forward from the previous year, \pounds 5,328 11s. 2d. for distribution. The directors recommended a dividend at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum on the ordinary shares. The directors of the Darwin Paper Mills, and of the East Lancashire Paper Mills, have in each instance decided to pay for the last half year, a dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum.

During August, it is stated that nearly two million sixpenny postal orders were issued in connection with the present Limerick craze.

The twentieth Annual conference of the Institute of Journalists was opened on the 14th ult., at Scarborough. The president, this year, is Sir Frederick Wilson, editor of the *East Anglian Daily Times*.
