



M. ARMISTEAD, of Messrs. T. Owen & Co., Ltd., says that paper pulp arriving at the works at 12 o'clock noon, can be converted into paper, printed, and sold in the streets as evening papers the same afternoon. This is certainly a hustle with a vengeance, but anything appears possible nowadays.

At last the air has been conquered, and it does not appear to be a far cry to the time when we shall receive our morning paper by aeroplane or other flying machine. Already they must be classed in the category of gifts, the *Morning Post* having presented an airship, on the Lebaudy principle, to the British Army.

Professor W. Herzberg, head of the Government Paper Testing Institute, of Berlin, has produced a liquid by the use of which wood pulp paper may be indefinitely preserved. According to the Sales and Wants Advertiser, the success of the new treatment, which involves dipping the sheets to be preserved in a chemical solution, is said to be very surprising. Sheets which before were rotting and about to fall to pieces, can be handled readily, and acquire a parchment-like firmness. If, after an interval of several decades, it should be found necessary to repeat immersion in the solution, this will not damage the paper, and it would seem that in this way published matter might be preserved for centuries.

# RACTICAL NOTES

The Importance of Careful Oiling.

Mr. WILLIAM DUNSTAN, machine overseer in the Government Printing Office, Sydney, N.S.W., in a paper read before the New South Wales Printers' Overseers' Association, said: I once had

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a machinist under my charge who, on one occasion, started to work a job first thing in the morning without oiling his machine. He evidently thought I did not notice his neglect in this matter. When I accused him of it he said, "Why, I oiled her yesterday morning; in fact, she is swimming in oil. Look!" He rubbed his hand under one of the arches in the frame and brought it out covered with dirt and oil. I at once tried to impress upon him that that was not the place for oil, and that it was very discreditable to him, as a machinist, to allow it to accumulate there. I told him the frame of any printing machine requires no oil-only the parts that are always on the move. Whenever possible, I make it my business to see that my hands oil their machines every morning before running up colour-if they neglect to do so I am not backward in giving them a reminder, gentle or otherwise. I do not believe in the practice of allowing feed boys to oil up valuable machinery-it is only in rare instances that I have found one or two that could be trusted in this respect. I am very particular on these points. The life of a machine depends very largely on the class of men who have charge of it; and I maintain that the man in charge should do the oiling himself, and not trust boys, the majority of whom have no interest in life except to dodge the "boss" and smoke cigarettes in any out-of-the-way corner,

I cannot impress too strongly on the young machinist the importance of being very careful about oiling the machine under his charge, regularly. Oil main bearings twice a day if the machine has to run all day, and even if the machine should bappen to be an old one, she will be grateful to you and respond to your care. Also remember that when a machine stands all night the oil drains away from the bearings, and that is why it is important the oil holes should be replenished before starting in the morning. Oiling takes but a few minutes, but they are minutes well spent -

"Tanner, London." the life of the machine will be prolonged, and the printers' engineer will not be seen so often in the office to effect repairs. By being particular in this respect you will prevent many a big leak.

Another good practice is to occasionally-say once a week-try all the nuts and screws on your machine, to see if any have worked loose, and, in the case of a new machine, try them every day until the machine has thoroughly settled down to work, as it were. Many a breakage has taken place through the want of a little care in this respect .- Printers' Register.

Something For Nothing.

"A late philosopher is reported to have observed that our country contains so many million persons. mostly fools. Taking a general survey of matters," says Mr. A. C. Huckstepp, "one cannot help

wondering whether the philosopher was blessed with prophetic vision and foresaw the hundreds of 'flat-catching advertisements' which would to-day make their originators rich beyond even the dreams of a Carnegie or a Rockefeller, even if there were no line beyond which these gentlemen could not venture with safety. The very existence of such traders proves conclusively that there is a large section of the community which requires to be protected against itself. Most buyers are wanting, if not something for nothing, certainly half-a-crown's worth for two shillings, and, strangest part of it all, believe that they can get it. This has brought about a state of things in which the morality of trade has been forced down to a low level. Price being the only consideration, quality has in too many cases had to be sacrificed and retailers themselves have too often gone with the stream, and in the vain belief that a low price is the only way to profitable business, cut and cut until they have found themselves beaten even at this game by one whose staying powers in the shape of a bank balance happens to be greater. Believe me, the public, generally speaking, are open to listen to the 'quality argument,' they can be made to believe that a low price does not always stand for cheapness, but the gospel requires preaching, and the retailer who will tactfully and consistently preach it will not often lose a sale. Indeed, it is better to make the sale on the low price if it will not materialise on the higher 'after' the quality talk, because the force of the argument will assuredly come home to the buyer when the article proves itself, as it nearly always does, quite the reverse of a bargain. A reaction must follow. The pendulum has swung as far as it can swing in the direction of low prices and sacrificed quality, and one hears now more frequently than was the case a few years ago the argument that only the good is cheap."

Bronzing, according to a report of the Home Office, is carried on in about one thousand factories and employs about three thousand hands. It is satisfactory to learn from the report that as regards toxic effects due to the character of the dust, the ailments arising therefrom have been found to be temporary, and seldom lead to definite attacks of illness. At the same time, satisfactory dust extractors are strongly recommended in rooms used exclusively for bronzing.

Every branch of the Scottish District Council of the Bookbinders' and Machine Rulers' Consolidated Union has presented a memorial to the Masters' Federation, asking for the minimum wage to be increased from 32/- to 34/-, and for 10 per cent. to be added to piece rates.

According to the Printer's Register, a circular has been issued from the Home Office by the Departmental Committee on Accidents in Factories and Workshops, wherein suggestions are made that the law relating to the guarding of dangerous machinery should be amended as follows: (1) Parts of machines which are dangerous and require guarding, should as far as possible be specified, either by statute or statutory orders made by the Secretary of State; (2) It should be made compulsory on all machine makers to guard the parts so specified, and to sell a machine not fitted with the required guards should be made an offence. Objections have been raised to placing the guarding of machinery upon makers, irrespective of the views of users and of the market for which the machines may be intended. In view, moreover, of the conflict of opinion among factory inspectors as to the guards required, it is suggested that some competent authority should be appointed by the Home Office to decide on the nature of the guards required.

It is problematical, to say the least, says the Sales and Wants Advertiser, if a thousand persons of the countless millions who to-day will be using blotting paper, have ever speculated how it came into use. A French contemporary, however, has been enlightening its readers on the subject. The discovery was the result of an accident. Some time in the last century an operative in mills in Berkshire omitted to put the size into his pulp. When the paper was rolled it was deemed useless, and the unfortunate workman received his congé. Some days afterwards, when they were about to throw the paper away, a quick-witted woman discovered its power of absorption, and tried it with some written matter. The old sand-box which up to that time had been used for drying ink was discarded, and the workman reinstated and rewarded for his negligence. We may add that in comparatively recent years, millers in out-away places sprinkled flour over their accounts to dry the ink, but we suppose at this period the flour dredge has gone the way of the sand-box. It is affirmed that the poster found its origin in France, dating back to 1836, when a design by Lalance was used to advertise a book of the period. The colour poster began about 1860, and attained the dignity of a high art with Jules Chéret, who has been termed the father of the picture placard.

The last report of the Burnley Paper Works Co., Ltd., shows a nett profit of £5,877. The amount brought forward was £10,968, enabling the directors to declare a dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. for the year and to pay a bonus of 10/- per share. £7,897 was carried forward. The half-yearly report of the Edinburgh Cooperative Printing Co., Ltd. shows that the divisible profit amounts to £454 15s. 11d. The directors recommend the payment of a dividend at the rate of 7 per cent, per annum. The usual percentage of profits transferred to the employees' Provident Fund amounts to £47 4s. 5d. The International Linotype Co., Ltd., has declared an interim dividend of 21 per cent, as against 2 per cent, for the corresponding period of last year.

A syllabus of lectures and classes for journalists has been issued by the Manchester University. The ordinary course includes English History, Irish History, Political Economy, Industry and Commerce, Political Science, Composition and English Literature, There is also a special course of six lectures on "Makers of Great Britain" and four lectures on "Germany in the Nineteenth Century."
