#### THE PRINTING DISPUTE.

A T the time of going to press we regret to have to report that there is no settlement in sight. At the Conference held on January 24th neither side showed any indication of giving way. Thousands of notices have been handed in, so that the first steps towards a strike have been taken. While this is so, the movement has developed into a purely London fight and is not national as was at first intended it should be by the men-They believe that the adjustment they demand would mean employment for more men, but, on the other hand, the employers argue, and no doubt correctly, that it will mean more work being sent out of London to the provinces and the Continent, and the establishment of more non-union houses. The L.S.C. has spent close upon £25,000 in unemployed relief in one year, and it is further argued from the men's side (an argument which we must admit always appears archiac to us) that the employers get all the benefits of improved new machinery. It was such arguments which, in the early days of steam, led to Plug Riots in the North, and yet with it all it was impossible to stop the tide of progress, and ultimately it was proved that machinery was the greatest benefactor the world has ever witThe "Marlborough"

residuary legatee, participate to the extent of a further £1,000 when the estate has been wound up under the direction of the sole executor, Mr. J. Mortimer, the Secretary of the Foundation. Mr. Haworth's hobby was bell-ringing, and he was one of the team who rang at Westminster Abbey at the Accession, Jubilee, and Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria, and the Coronation of King Edward.

The printing for the Public Departments cost £292,500 in 1905-6, says the Sales and Wants Advertiser. Since then entirely new services have been thrown upon the Vote—charges for County Courts, for telephones, for labour exchanges, and provision for this year's census. These amount altogether to £32,000, making a total that, in the ordinary circumstances, would have to be met by a charge of £324,500 in the Vote for 1910-11. The Vote actually taken for 1910-11, however, is £265,000 only, representing a saving of £59,500. There was a prolonged autumn Session in 1909, which necessitated considerable addition to the Parliamentary Debates. There was also a great deal of extra printing needed for forms in connection with the Budget of 1909-10. In spite of these additional items, there was a saving of £2,000 a year on Parliamentary printing, and £10,000 on printing for Public Departments, making a total saving of £71,500.

There seems every indication that the Stationery Trade will not allow the Postmaster-General's Free Stationery scheme to go through without raising a serious protest. The Newsagent says the opinion of the trade throughout the United Kingdom is to be obtained, and that the matter will be seriously taken up by the Council of the S.P.A.T.A.

Mr. G. R. Sims presided at the 21st dinner of the Associated Wholesale Newsagents, Ltd., held at the Hotel Cecil on Jan. 17th.



# PRACTICAL NOTES

Quick Overlaying. THE following is suggested by the American Pressman:—Take any good gloss black ink with strong body and distribute it well before taking

impressions from the cut. Do not carry too much ink on the forme, but simply as much as will produce a full black colour. Make the forme ready and set the gauges and grippers; then print upon four or five sheets of the paper to be used for the run, feeding each one of these accurately to the gauges, so that the sheets will register perfectly. As soon as the sheets have been printed upon, take ordinary wheat flour (or flower of emery) and dust this over the printing, so that the solids of the ink become solid with the flour covering. Shake off the superfluous flour and run the sheets through again exactly to the guides, first carefully placing over the covered sheet a smooth sheet of any kind of thin paper. This will impress the flour solidly into the ink surfaces. Carefully lay the floured sheets (which have been run through the second time) upon a moderately warm surface of brick or iron, so that the flour and the ink may incorporate, and, as it were, bake dry. As soon as this has taken place, any objectionable lights may be toned or scraped away with a penknife from the different number of sheets desired for the overlay. The sheets are then ready to be registered to each other, previously to doing which, however, coat them over with a

thin solution mucilage to harden the surface before attaching them to each other, as in the case of cut-out overlays. A dozen of illustrations may be treated in this way before putting a forme to press. Of course, this method of make-ready of cuts is not equal to that of hand overlaying by the cut-out method, but good results may be obtained.


British Goods in America.

IT is a fact of considerable importance, says Mr. H. L. Allen in Printer's Ink, when introducing European-made goods into the United States, that there is in this country a tourist and travelling class of some proportions, which has met with many worthy foreign products when abroad, and has long wished the latter could be bought here at home. This is a business asset to begin with-and one which rarely obtains in the case of American-made goods being introduced abroad. On the other hand, there are two great difficulties when it comes to introducing foreign-made goods in this country. One is the question of our import duties. The other is the utter unfamiliarity of foreign manufacturers with everything American. As a rule, the American public which has come to appreciate what a foreign label stands for is willing to pay a reasonable advance in price in order to get foreign-made goods. Our tariff system is ever a threatening danger in another way, too. It often happens, after a line of foreignmade goods has been extensively advertised and successfully sold in this country for some time, that a revision of the tariff schedules takes place, as it did during the last session of Congress. The new and higher schedule necessitates such advances in price as no reasonable consumer could be expected to pay. The result is that either the line is withdrawn from the American market or else it starts on a down grade, due to the boost of its prices. The average European manufacturer turns last towards the United States as a possible market. It may be said that the average American producer undertakes to develop foreign markets without much idea of what he is doing. But the average American producer, according to general opinion, is no worse in this regard than the average European producer is when he comes to tackle the American market. The average European producer not only does not know American geography, and hence the probable distribution costs on this side of the water, but he utterly fails to comprehend the American character. In a stubborn sort of way, he thinks that the advertising, which was good enough for England, or France, or Germany, must

be good enough for the United States, and he grants his appropria-

tion on that basis. But never was a sadder mistake made.

# WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

THE last report of Wyman and Sons, Ltd., shows a net profit, before allowing for Debenture interest, of £24,900. The Directors recommend a dividend of 5 per cent. on the Ordinary shares. The report of the Lanston Monotype Corporation shows a net profit of £39,700, which is an increase on the previous year of £15,200. Of the above amount £4,700 is placed to reserve and £15,000 is set aside for extensions in plant during the current year. A dividend was declared at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum. At the annual general meeting of Waterlow and Sons, Ltd., it was announced that the net profits for the year amounted to £156,819, which, with the balance of £5,708 brought forward, gave £162,527 for appropriation. The directors recommended a dividend on the Ordinary shares at the rate of 15 per cent, per annum, together with a bonus of 1 per cent. £30,000 was placed to reserve, bringing this fund to £390,000, and £11,027 was carried forward. In connection with the fund established for the benefit of the workpeople and the pension scheme, the directors stated that the sum of £19,350 had been expended up to the close of the last financial year in pensions, grants in cases of sickness, etc. The directors of the Financial News, Ltd., state that the net profits for the year amount to £45,110. This enabled the directors to recommend a final dividend of 5 per cent, on the Ordinary shares, making 10 per cent, for the year, and to pay a bonus of 5/- per share, altogether making a total distribution of 35 per cent, for the year, £5,596 was placed to reserve, and £7,500 was placed to a second reserve fund for the equalisation of dividend on the Ordinary shares.

and was commenced in China. The art reached Europe either by Mediterranean travellers, or through Persia, during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries. It appears that playing cards and religious pictures were the first to be published, but, in Mr. Guppy's opinion, it is a most point as to which of these two came first.

Reports come to hand that there is every likelihood of mills being established in Tasmania for the manufacture of paper from timber grown in the island. The capital required is estimated at about a quarter of a million sterling.
