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

#### THE PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE.

THE outcome of the Moor Lane Fire has been the appointment, by the Home Secretary, of a committee to inquire and report as to the precautions necessary in the use of celluloid in the manufacture and the handling and storage of celluloid and celluloid articles. The names of the members of the committee are as follows: - The Earl of Plymouth, Chairman; Prof. I. I. Dobbie, Principal Government Chemist: Capt. M. B. Lloyd, who was a Home Office Inspector of Explosives; Mr. H. M. Robinson, Deputy Chief-Inspector of Factories; Mr. E. O. Sachs, Chairman of the Executive of the British Fire Prevention Committee. powers that be in the printing trade should lose no time in communicating with this Committee, so as to submit evidence from the trade. This step has already been taken in other trades, for it is felt that the matter is of extreme importance to all those who have to use celluloid, in any form, in the daily routine of their business. A Government Committee has always the power to suggest legislation which might prove detrimental to the best interests of a particular trade, and it is for this reason we suggest that the printing trade should hold a watching brief to see that the trade is treated with equity and fairness.

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
by members, and the event was pronounced by all as one of the most successful ever held in the history of the Institute.

Winter's Pie is to be published on Nov. 4th under the editorship of Mr. W. H. Spottiswoode. It is to be a Christmas number of Printers' Pie.

"Disloyalty of the Wholesaler." This subject was again discussed at a recent conference of the kindred trades, held at the St. Bride Foundation. The following resolution was unanimously agreed to:-"That this meeting having afforded opportunity to the representatives of most of the allied industries to discuss the subject of the desirability of trade and wholesale houses giving preferential treatment to printers and stationers, is of the opinion that the matter is not one on which there can be any concrete or definite agreement, and is also of the opinion that the grievances existing could be better removed by individual missionary work." The council of the institute state that they "are gratified to know that as the result of their efforts in this matter steps have already been taken by certain firms to conform to the terms of the above resolution, and they venture to express the opinion that such resolution is worthy of the favourable consideration of all who have at heart the best interests of the printing and kindred trades."

papers. The property was finally knocked down to Mr. C. W. Starmer at, it is understood, £16,350.

The L.C.C. lectures on paper-making, now being held in the new schools, Bolt Court, should appeal to our readers. The course is very comprehensive, and is given by Mr. A. A. Whalley, on Monday evenings at 7.0 o'clock, whilst the advanced lectures are given on Friday evenings at the same hour. Persons under 21 years of age, who are bona fide engaged in the trade, are admitted free. To others, the fee is 5s. for the course.

An American was the guest of honour at a Chinese mandarin's house, and at dinner one of the courses consisted of eggs apparently quite whole, yet within them was a delicate salad of mushrooms, lettuce, nuts and mustard. "It puzzles me," said he to the mandarin, "how all these things are put inside a whole egg." Sir Edward Henry, Commissioner of Police, has ordered the stoppage of the street distribution of handbills within a six-mile radius of Charing Cross. It is said that it will affect the livelihood of 1,000 bill distributors. Sir Edward says that in nearly every case where advertising matter is distributed in the streets the handbill is speedily thrown down on the path or roadway, thus littering up the streets and giving extra work to the local authorities.

Selected subjects from those successful at the National Competition, 1912, held by the Board of Education, were recently arranged at South Kensington and open for inspection. The designs exhibited included samples of work from the classes in typography, lithography, book-binding, as well as the various subjects of study in connection with the art schools in various parts of the country. On the whole the prize designs may be regarded as well up to the average of recent years. This at least applied to lithographic drawing and designing, and perhaps to bookbinding. Typography was chiefly represented by title pages and bookwork.

To Save Time in Correcting. It would appear to a casual thinker that all the simple, ingenious devices possible for saving time to the compositor working on the ordinary case had been thought of and put in practice. But

something new in this line, says a correspondent of the Practical Printer, comes to one's observation every little while.

The other day I noted a rather neat time-saving expedient in use by a compositor who had a great deal of correcting to do. Everybody is familiar with the usual style. Put a galley on your lower-case, at an angle, and slide it backward and forward, up and down—any way required—to get it out of the way for the particular letter required. And the type you want is somehow always under the galley. But this compositor had really devised something entirely new.

In the first place, he put his lower-case on the upper part of his frame, where the cap-case usually goes, and put the cap-case down under the galley. The cap-case was divided as usual, and was like any other cap-case save in the arrangement. He had shifted the caps and small caps from the four lower to the four upper rows of the case. The galley covered only the little-used sorts normally placed in the four upper rows. Consequently he had before him, as he worked, an uncovered lower-case and an uncovered cap-case.

I could not but think, as I observed the rapidity with which this compositor made his corrections, that a good man, who is genuinely interested in his business, will always come to the front and make money for himself and his employer where a poor man, anxious only to fill in his time, would barely earn his salt. There is a lesson in this little incident for every thoughtful printer. Every minute saved is so much gained. Can you think of no simple plan of making your work easier and at the same time increasing the output of the office? Every invention in the way of time-saving machinery had its origin in the patient thought of some observing, careful man as to how the doing of any more or less complex operation could be simplified.

# WHAT OTHERS TO ARE DOING

A N International Exhibition of the Book Industry and Graphic Arts is to be held in Leipzig from May to October, 1914. It will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Royal Academy of Graphic Arts, and, according to the prospectus, the object is to promote friendly international competition in the kindred arts and industries. There will be 16 groups, which will be divided into 63 classes, so that every phase of the printing industry will be represented.

There are in Dublin several printing firms that have a continuous history of upwards of a century. The oldest existing firm of the kind in the city was established in 1770, and this firm is said to have been the first to introduce the ingenious ruling machine.

In connection with the subject of supplying experimental sketches for the obtaining of printing and other orders, says the *Printer's Register*, and the many disputes arising therefrom, which are carried very often into the courts of law, a correspondent prints in the official circular of the master printers' federation the following note:—

They do things better in the States! In the office of every Typothetæ member hangs a card, "Customs of the Printing Trade," and among these customs is, "Experimental Orders: All work produced in an experimental way at customer's request will be considered an order, and all composition, sketches, drawings, plates, presswork, and materials will be charged for." Copies of these "customs," too, are sent out broadcast with all proofs and letters and to all buyers of printing.

That should be the practice to follow here.





The Bank of England, says The Sales and Wants Advertiser, employed about 130 boys between 14 and 16 years of age who were engaged in the printing department as "layers on" and "takers off" of the bank notes, postal orders, Consol certificates, dividend warrants, stationery, etc. They received 7s. to 10s. a week, and recently they came out on strike because they felt that three of their number had been treated unjustly.

In addition, the boys, and, indeed, some of the men, seemed to be dissatisfied at the introduction of a timing-machine, which, they asserted, shortened their luncheon hour, as they were delayed in timing off.

The Bank's reply to the lad's ultimatum—Capitulation by the authorities on the question of fines, or no work—was met with the reply, "Instant resumption of work or dismissal, with half a week's wages." Later the strike was ended by the Bank authorities paying off the boys and dispensing with their services, the lads being informed that their places had been filled.
