# News in Brief

N connection with Income Tax Allowances, the Associated Chambers of Commerce has issued a copy of the following letter, received from the Inland Revenue officials, which it

will be seen relates to printing works.

"I have laid before the Board of Inland Revenue your letter on the subject of allowances for depreciation of machinery and plant in the cases of the shipping industry, paper mills and printing works, and in reply I am directed to state for the information of your association that such allowances fall to be made by the General Commissioners of Taxes or by the Special Commissioners of Income Tax, as the case may require. The Board, however, have always endeavoured, wherever practicable, to secure a measure of uniformity in the treatment of such claims, and as regards the industries to which you refer, the following represents the usual practice:

"PRINTING WORKS

"(a) No objection is raised where the Commissioners grant allowances not exceeding 5 per cent. in respect of engines, boilers and shafting, and 7½ per cent. in respect of printing binding machines.

"(b) Type is as a general rule dealt with by way of an allowance for actual cost of renewal, but should depreciation be insisted on, an

allowance not exceeding 10 per cent. is assented to.

"(c) Special and delicate machinery is dealt with according to the facts of each case.

"The above allowances in the case of printing works are calculated on the written down value, i.e., on the balance of value left, at the end of the year preceding the year of assessment, after deduction from the prime cost of the sums allowed for depreciation, and the additions of sums spent on additions and renewals.

"In all cases where an allowance is made for depreciation, the cost of renewals and replacements, less any allowances made for obsolescence.

on the subject of the blind in the House of Commons, stated that Mr. Pearson, smitten with blindness in the prime of his active life, had appealed to him to speak for the motion.

In a recent lecture at Manchester, Mr. R. B. Fishenden stated that during the last eight or ten years there had been practically no advance in the quality of illustration work, and that during the last five or six years the half-tone process had stood at a dead level of high-grade mediocrity.

The will of Mr. Henry Richardson, printer and stationer, Greenwich, shows an estate of the gross value of £13,889, of which £13,265 is net personalty; that of Sir John Tenniel, the well-known Punch cartoonist at £10,500; that of Mr. James Buckley, printer, Leeds, at £19,794; that of Mr. E. C. Mitchell, journalist, and well known under the penname of " Captain Coe," at £6,491, and that of Mr. Henry Cox, printer, &c. of Scarborough, at £6,567.

To celebrate the 75th anniversary of the foundation of the firm, and the jubilee of Mr. Walter Hazell, Messrs. Hazell, Watson and Viney recently gave a dinner, at which there was a large gathering, including Lord Lyveden, Sir T. Vesey Strong, Mr. J. F. Remnant, M.P., Mr. T. Fisher Unwin, &c.

According to the annual report of the Printers' Pension Corporation, the total income of the Pension Fund was £11,402; of the Almshouse Fund, £1,131; and of the Orphan Fund, £1,575. There are now no fewer than 550 pensioners, together with the almshouse inmates, and a number of orphan children. The amount distributed last year was double that distributed ten years ago. Sir Vesey Strong, who presided, stated that it was the fourteenth time he had held that office at the annual meeting of the Corporation. Mr. G. Rowland Blades and Mr. C. W. Bowerman, M.P. were re-elected as trade auditors.

There are 9,304 newspapers and periodicals in Germany, of which 3,894 are dailies, the rest being trade and other papers. The dailies have a total circulation of eighteen million copies, and the trade papers a circulation of about thirty-four million copies.

The Sales and Wants Advertiser asks the question "Will picture stamps take the place of picture postcards?" These stamps are used for sealing letters or parcels, or for adorning the front of an envelope, and already letter writers can have their favourite authors on their stamps, or a series of pictorial peeps at classic fairy-tales, or views of the Empire.

It is satisfactory to be able to report that the Government has now decided to spend £13,000 in officially participating in the forthcoming printing exhibition to be held at Leipzig.

# Practical Notes

#### THE TYPOGRAPHY OF BOOKS

OOD taste, a quality essential to the successful production of all kinds of printing, is of great importance in the typography of books. In the matter of good taste most of us are specialists—we perfect our judgment in some one respect and let it remain erratic in others. A musician or other artist may stand high in his class and yet, perhaps, show poor taste in dress and manners.

A person of good taste is usually conservative. He weighs all new things in the balance of judgment, and allows enthusiastic faddists to push him off the sidewalk rather than join the crowd and shout with it. He knows the fickleness of mobs and remembers that in a week hosannas have been changed to shouts of bitter invective. The merchant catering to the whims of fashion ever has unsaleable stock on his shelves. In the days of militant Rome the crowd which one day cheered Sulla, the next day crowned Marius with laurel.

The natural tendency of humanity is radical. The conservatives are in the minority, yet their influence is great because their opinions are generally based upon sure foundations. Of course a person can be progressive and possess a present-day mind without being either radical or conservative. The natural tendency of job printers is radical. Left much to their own whims and fancies they produce printed things which may please only for the moment. The test of gold is not in its appearance when purchased, but in years of wear. Because a job of printing is made for short service is no reason why it should not be as well done as book composition is required to be. All the art-reasons in book typography are equally applicable to job typography. The two methods should not be judged by separate standards—a thing is good, or it is not. At the present time educational work is elevating the standard of job typography, and the designer of job composition, drawing closer to his book brother, is beginning to notice the faults and flaws in the latter's work.

William Morris set out to change book typography, and in contrast to the typography of the day his ideas may have seemed radical. What he really offered was the good things found in the works of the old masters of Venice and Nuremberg—typography and decoration that had well stood the test of centuries. Book pages produced fifty years ago by Pickering and Whittingham look well to-day; not because they are old, but because they were in good taste then, and are in good taste now. Pages set by their comtemporaries in condensed roman look abominable now, because they were contrary to true art principles then.

# What Others are Doing\*

THE Times has become a "Society" house, and in future trade union labour will be employed in the printing department. This decision will affect 400 men, of which number about 250 are compositors.

Messrs. Sangorski and Sutcliffe are now exhibiting an illuminated manuscript of some of the poems by Keats, which is bound in a cover containing over a thousand precious stones.

The crusade against vulgar postcards still goes on apace. At Berwick, five members of the trade have been appointed to act as a Board of Censors to prevent the circulation of objectionable postcards. Speaking at the First Annual Meeting of the Scarborough Postcard Censorship Association, the Chief Constable referred to the excellent work of the Committee, and stated that the institution of such Committees was causing publishers to issue a better class of card.

The Stereotypers' and Electrotypers' Society Assistants have amalgamated with the National Society of Operative Printers and Assistants.

The Annual Report of Messrs. Odhams Ltd. shows a gross profit, for 1913, of £39,012, and net profit, after providing for all charges, of £25,590. A dividend on the preference shares at the rate of 7h per cent. per annum, was declared, together with a dividend on the ordinary shares of 9 per cent, per annum, leaving a balance of £12,041, of which £2,041 was carried forward, the remainder being placed to various reserve funds. It is satisfactory to be able to report that the profits are more than twice the average figures given in the company's prospectus of May 1912. The annual report of Messrs. Edward Lloyd Ltd. shows an increase in the profits during the past year of £12,000, which enabled the Directors to declare a dividend, on the ordinary shares, at the rate of 111 per cent. per annum, and to add £20,000 to the reserve fund. The last annual report of Messrs. Cassell and Co. Ltd. shows a net profit of £41,602, which is equivalent to an increase of 30 per cent. on the preceding year, and with two exceptions is the largest profit which has ever been earned in one year by the Company. A dividend at the rate of 5 per cent per annum was declared, \$8,000 was placed to reserve, £8,000 to the copyright equalisation fund, and £2,000 to writing down

discount on debenture issue. It cannot be denied that the Board is to be congratulated on its success, and we are particularly interested to hear that Mr. Arthur Spurgeon, the general manager, has now been made a director of the company. The report of the Lamson Paragon Supply Co. Ltd. shows that the profits for the last financial year amounted to £36,491, and after providing for depreciations, &c. there was a balance of £31,319 for appropriation. This enabled the directors to propose a dividend on the ordinary shares equivalent to 7½ per cent. per annum, and to place to investments reserve £2,561, and carry forward £4,135. The last annual report of John Dickenson and Co. Ltd. shows that the net profit for last year amounts to £87,794, as compared with £99,471 of the previous year. Although there was a fall in profit, the sales showed an increase; it was stated that the principal reason for the reduction in profit occurred at the Croxley Mills, where there had been an increase in waste, together with increased wages.

About 300 employees of the Solicitors' Law Stationery Society, Ltd. attended the last annual meeting of the company, when the Chairman announced that the turnover had increased from £76,056 in 1912 to £77,110 last year. This enabled the directors to declare a dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, so that under the profit-sharing system in connection with the business, the bonus on the earnings of the staff was at the rate of 4 per cent., which was the same rate as was paid last year. This bonus is equivalent to a fortnight's wages to each employee who was qualified, and totalled £1,112 as against £999 in the previous year.

To mark his business jubilee, Mr. E. Straker, chairman of Messrs. Straker Bros. Ltd. presented the members of the staff with bonuses. Employees with twenty-five years' service and over received six weeks' wages, and the scale graduated down to those with two years' service. The event also marked Mr. Edgar Straker's withdrawal from active service in the company.
