




IANY of our customers, especially amongst those who have recently joined the ranks of the printers, will. no doubt, be glad to know something of our past history. The business was founded in 1864 by Mr. R. T. Tanner and Mr. J. Hunt, at Upper Thames Street. and was carried on under the title of Hunt & Tanner.

There was a dissolution of partnership in 1877, Mr. Hunt continuing the business at the old address, while Mr. Tanner established the present business at 16. Dorset Street. Mr. F. Garrett became associated with the business about 1879, and on the death of Mr. R. Tanner, it was carried on by the executors for ten years, until Mr. W. A. Tanner came of age. This was in 1888, and in 1896 Mr. Garrett was made a partner, and in 1900 Mr. A. Tanner, the youngest son of the founder, entered the firm.

In 1903 the warehouse and factory in Hutton Street and Primrose Hill was partially destroyed by fire and had to be rebuilt. Four years later the business was converted into a private limited company, the directors being W. A. Tanner, F. Garrett, A. Tanner, H. S. Pearsall, and A. Eames. In the same year, namely, 1908, Mr. W. A. Tanner died. In order to cope with an ever increasing business, additional premises, adjoining the old premises in Dorset Street, were taken in 1911. which allowed us to carry larger and more representative stocks than we had done in the past,

Our present directors are Mr. F. Garrett, Chairman; Mr. A. Tanner, Controller of Sales Department; Mr. A. Eames, Buying Department; Mr. H. S. Pearsall and Mr. F. A. Garrett, M.C. The firm is well represented by Messrs, S. C. Wakefield, G. F. Maisey, R. Scruby, C. Stacy, M. Smith, W. H. Pocklington, H. Pearsall, and F. H. Cuthbert, while Mr. F. A. Squire and A. Krolle represent the leather department. The Secretary is Mr. G. J. Bird.

News in Brief



HE seventy-ninth Annual Meeting of the Vellum Binders and Machine Rulers' Pension Society was held at St. Bride's Institute, on Monday, 6th March, Mr. F. A. GARRETT, JUNE., presiding. The chairman, in moving the adoption of the Annual Report and Balance Sheet, drew attention to the satis-

factory state of the affairs of the Society, due in a great measure to the efforts of their experienced Secretary, Mr. F. C. Peacock, and to their energetic Committee. Mr. C. W. Atkins (Co-Op. Printing Society) moved a resolution that the Society should call upon the Friendly Societies and Trades Unions to urge that the pensions granted by them to their members should be made free from assessment as income. The Voting Papers having been counted, the following Pensioners were declared elected:—

MISS S. A. JOHNSON, MR. A. T. SHARP.

MISS J. MARR received the unsuccessful Candidate's grant.
MR. H. R. DANFORD proposed and MR. T. J. HUNT seconded a
vote of thanks to the chairman, bringing a very businesslike
meeting to a close.

At the invitation of Mr. Atkins, several of those present afterwards attended a Dance given by the Staff of the Co-Op. Printing Society, Ltd., where they spent a very enjoyable evening.

We have received an offer from a printer in Budapest to print and post advertising circulars at a ridiculously low price, and to give a sworn statement (for what that may be worth) certifying the number of circulars printed. What interests us most is the cost of postage, which per thousand circulars is 7/-. To this has to be added a commission of 4/- per thousand, making the postage rate 11/- per thousand, or about two circulars for a farthing. Is it not about time that Mr. Kellaway woke up? This country receives no revenue whatsoever for distributing circulars posted in this way from Budapest.

The demands made by the Newspaper Proprietors' Association, to which we drew attention in a recent issue, for reduction of

wages, longer hours, and reduced privileges, have been withdrawn. It was eventually proposed that an all-round cut of ten shillings per week, in two instalments of five shillings, should be made.

An organisation which is capable of doing much good is the Trade Marks, Patents and Designs Federation, of 329, High Holborn, W.C. Among the objects of the Federation are:—To promote the interests of British owners of trade mark rights, to prevent the infringement of British industrial property abroad, to promote the formation of a world alliance of industrial property owners, to obtain international agreements for the protection of regional appellations, town names, and national emblems, to consider a system of international registration of trade marks, and to educate traders as to the value of industrial property rights.

It is proposed to transfer the St. Bride Printing School to Stamford Street, Blackfriars, where the maintenance cost will be increased by £5,200 per annum, making £12,000 in all. Of this amount £2,500 per annum is to be guaranteed for five years by various organisations connected with the industry, which fund is already available, thanks to the efforts of the joint committee of which LORD RIDDELL is the chairman.

The cover of this issue is designed by Mr. L. A. Garrerr, the youngest son of our Managing Director, who is taking up Art as his profession. The drawing augurs well for the future success of "Mr. Lewis." It is bold, striking, and convincing, three qualifications very necessary for Art in its relationship to modern commerce.

It is said that in order to cope with the large amount of printing that the State Printing Works have undertaken in the last year or two, it has been necessary to spend a very large sum in buying plant and buildings at very high post-war prices. In 1921 an expenditure of £228,000 appeared in the Supplementary Estimates. Meanwhile an enormous amount of similar plant is lying idle in the works of printers throughout the country, says the Sales and Wants Advertiser. The majority of this plant, in the hands of trade printers, was bought at pre-war prices, and the cost of running this plant is, therefore, considerably less than with the new plant bought at post-war prices. Speaking on this matter recently, Dr. MacLehose says that a very large volume of work has been given to the State Printing Works without any tenders being invited from outside firms, and it is hard to say how much money is lost to

the country by such action. The Telephone Directories had been satisfactorily produced for many years by a large firm of printers. About two years ago this work was taken away from these contractors, who were not even told that the work was being taken from them and sent to the Government works. The cost of setting up the type of these directories must have been thousands of pounds, and the value of the standing type was entirely lost. The Post Office Guide, until a few months ago, was printed by a well-known firm of contractors. When tenders were recently invited by the Stationery Office for a new issue the existing contractors, because they had it all standing in type, quoted a very low price, but neither their offer nor that of any other contractor was accepted. The Government Printing Works took the work themselves, and all the standing type was wasted. In both these cases the usual excuse was made that the Government proposed to make alterations in the style, and, therefore, they would reset the whole of the type themselves.

According to the Daily Mail, the latest Society craze is for striped notepaper. The stripes are of the same colour as the paper, but of slightly deeper shades, producing an effect very similar to the pre-war striped wall-papers.

Lecturing recently on Letterpress Printing and Art, Mr. E. Walker said:—"Books printed by men who derive pleasure from so doing were real works of art." This remark applies very forcibly to the beautiful works issued by William Morris at the Kelmscott Press, as it does to-day to the books printed and published by Mr. Hornby, at the Ashendene Press, of which the latest is "Fioretti di S. Francesco."

"Universal Printers, Ltd., London," has been formed with a capital of £800,000. It is a combination which includes Messrs. Bemrose & Sons, Ltd., Derby; Messrs. Alf. Cooke, Ltd., Leeds; and Messrs. LORD BEAVERBROOK stated at a recent dinner that when he took over the Daily Express there was a loss in the preceding vear of £40,000. During the year July, 1920, to July, 1921, the paper consumed newsprint of the value of £900,000, as against a pre-war figure of £150,000, the result being that his lordship had to put during the year, into the coffers of the Daily Express, cash to the value of £140,000. The price of news-print has fallen from £60 per ton to £20 per ton.

What was the house organ of Messrs. Penrose & Co., Ltd., namely. Process Work and Electrotyping, is to be enlarged, and will be issued in future by Messrs. Percy Lund, Humphries and Co., Ltd., as an independent quarterly, under the title Process Work and the Printer.

The DUKE OF YORK will preside at the Anniversary Festival Dinner of the Printers' Pension, Almshouse and Orphan Asylum Corporation, to be held at the Connaught Rooms, Great Queen Street, W.C. 2, on November 15th.

German carpets, made of paper, are said to be so close an imitation of the real thing as to render detection almost impossible. There appears to be no end to the uses to which paper may be used in one form or another.

The annual dinner of the Paper-makers' Association was held on March 24th, under the Chairmanship of the President, MR. LEONARD Tond. Practically all sections of the printing industry was represented at the gathering.

At the annual meeting of the Newspaper Press Fund, presided over by Lord Burnham, it was announced that donations during the past year reached the record figure of £10,411. Forty-eight pensions are being paid, amounting to £2,542, an increase of £508 compared with 1920; of the annuitants, 21 are members and 27 the widows of members. No fewer than 356 grants were made in 1921, against 254 in 1920, and the amount spent in grants and pensions was £10,689, nearly £2,000 more than in the previous year.

for conservatism, self-satisfaction and complacency - and

whilst their Craft has educated the world, they themselves, it must be admitted, have not been numbered amongst those who have readily adopted scientific principles applicable to their business.

I submit that most printers could with advantage follow the custom of the medical profession and certain prominent industries, and periodically call in a consultant with a practical knowledge of the industry, who out of his experience and by investigation of existing methods and equipment might proffer suggestions that would be helpful not only to the firm but also to those controlling the various departments. Not that the " specialist " is likely to know more about the particular class of work done by those engaged in it, but by observation and in consultation with those responsible for the productive side of the business he would be of assistance in helping to diagnose the troubles which are over-abundant in every printing office. It is not usual to find heads of departments who object to discuss their difficulties with someone who has a practical and sympathetic understanding of their problems. It is equally true in the printing business as in other walks of life that what is nearest to the eye is most difficult to see.

It is a frequent occurrence to find firms equipped with plant totally unsuitable for their particular needs, or one department equipped with the most modern of labour-saving machinery, while other equally important departments are not so efficiently laid out. It being seemingly overlooked that, just as the strength of a chain lies in its weakest link, so it cannot be expected to obtain the best production if every department is not planned to cope with the increased efficiency accruing from the adoption of modern plant, backed by sound organisation. Yet many firms seem to be totally unconscious of what is apparent even to the casual observer. Now that printers have got the habit of calling in costing

experts to assist them in the financial side of their business, it is to be hoped that it will not be long before it becomes sustomary to discuss with some disinterested person matters affecting the productive side of the business.

In the future, success and a return commensurate with capital invested, skill required, and risks accepted will only come to those who are equipped to obtain the best in quality and quantity, coupled with an organisation which eliminates waste in time and labour.

There is money in the printing business, but in the past the printer did not always obtain it, mainly through lack of business instinct, unsuitable equipment, and his failure to recognise and keep abreast of new methods demanded by the ever expanding printing industry.
